We want to help you act on what this new law can mean for your music program, and how to gather resources and support at the ground level.

WHAT IS ESSA?

- The Every Student Succeeds Act was signed into law December, 2015 and replaces No Child Left Behind
- Decision-making about education programs has returned to the state level
- Considerations for program strategy will go into effect in the 2017-18 school year, so the time to plan and act is now!

WHY DOES IT MATTER?

- Increased funding for your music program
- Professional development support
- Expansion of Title I grant funds
- A music education for ALL children



You can be a part of ensuring the future of a quality music education for ALL children. Here's what you can do right now:

- **1. REACH OUT** and get involved in your state's Music Education Coalition. These are generally organized through the state MEA chapter. Offer your commitment and service.
- **2. REINFORCE** that music is designated as part of a well-rounded education, a new provision in the law.
- **3. REMIND** state, district and community leaders, and other music and arts stakeholders about the benefits of music education, and what it means for students and communities. Provide documents and data.
- **4. REQUEST** that school & community leaders work with the school district, which will ultimately work with state education departments.

Prepare a report indicating what resources are required to provide a "well-rounded education" to ALL students. Address the Opportunity to Learn (OTL) Standards which provide guidance on curriculum, scheduling, staffing, materials and equipment.		
PERFORM A NEEDS ASSESSMENT OF THE MUSIC PROGRAMS AVAILABLE AT YOUR SCHOOL.
